A Season of Miracles

A couple months into our Interim Journey, I began to worry about the possibility of beginning the Advent season without benefit of an Interim Rector. As weeks passed, my worry increased at the likelihood that we would be without an Interim Rector for Christmas – how daunting that challenge seemed! With visions of the wonders and glories of Christmases past, the notion of “pulling off a Christmas” without resident clergy seemed impossible.

As the Sundays during our “supply period” passed, each with the blessing of terrific Supply Clergy, I began to focus... “All we have to do is find a wonderful supply priest for Christmas Eve and everything will be great!” Ah, but this wasn't such an easy task, even starting a diligent search early. Every supply priest I contacted already had plans to spend the holidays with family, or had already determinedly gone into hibernation for the winter. Can't say I blamed them in the least, but the situation was getting progressively dire. With no small amount of desperation I prayed for a solution. Then as the tension was getting rather severe, Karen Sheldon, having already served several Sundays, expressing such fondness for the People of St. John's, said that she'd be delighted to serve on Christmas Eve, bringing her extended family in tow. Hallelujah! Now we are set – Karen and her family would share our Christmas Eve services with us, the Sunday School kids were diligently preparing a wonderful pageant for that evening; everything was going to be perfect after all.

But it's never good to get too confident, leastwise in affairs of God... a week and a half before Christmas Eve, Karen called with some disappointing news – the “cold” she had developed a couple weeks earlier had only gotten worse, and her doctor had ordered her to bed rest lest she come down with pneumonia. Making matters worse, her husband Richard had been hospitalized with pneumonia, though he was improving steadily. How dreadful.

As we earnestly prayed for their recovery, we were back at square one... worse, Christmas Eve was yet much closer. Things were really looking bad.

Contingency planning went into effect. Additional calls made to clergy netted no positive results. The Worship Committee now considered the real possibility of being with out benefit of clergy for Christmas. Evening Prayer and Pageant? Was it possible? Could we carry it off? On top of all the other minutiae the Worship Committee was trying to coordinate, we now had an entirely different and unfamiliar liturgy to attend to. That said, everyone quickly settled into the groove of making the best of it. We were going to do "this", and it would be, by God's grace, just fine.

And then it happened, just as the finishing touches were being put on the Evening Prayer liturgy, our mostly house-bound friend Burt Ulrich called me at home. Burt knew our plight and said that despite not little apprehension on his part, he couldn't leave us in the lurch. He said that if some people received communion only once per year, Christmas was no time to deny them of that. I couldn't agree more...

It was Christmas Eve far different than I ever imagined. It was Christmas Eve unlike any in the history of St. John's, I suspect. Never had I dreamt of wheeling Burt down the aisle during a Christmas processional to the altar now sitting at floor level, and how good it was seeing him there at that moment, again celebrating the Eucharist at the altar... of the team moving the altar back so that the scrim could be put in place for the children's both heartfelt and sometimes humorous pageant... of candlelight and carols and full pews—and of the blessings of community, family, teamwork and faith which made Christ so manifestly present at this re-creation of His birth.

It was indeed appropriate to feel so vulnerable, so exposed, so uncertain during this Advent season—watching, waiting, and anticipating. It was a gift to be reminded that God often answers our prayers in unexpected and unanticipated ways—better than we could have possibly imagined; as in the birth of a helpless infant born the Messiah in a barn in the dead of night. It was a blessing to realize that all of us working together towards the glory of God can indeed witness such a gift.

It was a Christmas to remember... a Season of Miracles.

Thanks be to God. Alleluia. Alleluia.
